"Tonopah - Each a century old or more, two of Nevada's oldest Indians, and probably the oldest Indian couple of the state, died here within a few days of each other last week. Both died at the Nye County Hospital, where they were entered recently suffering from infirmities of old age and severe colds. Known as Reveille George and Rosie, the aged couple had lived three quarters of a century at a small Indian family settlement near Eden Creek, Nye County.

When the first white settlers came to this section forty years ago Reveille George was an old man, versed in the traditions of the few Indians who had found the water holes of this vicinity and chosen to settle here. And Rosie was not young. During the years they maintained a primitive but independent and respected existence, cultivating a small patch of ground in the Kawich Hills. It is thought the Reveille George was over a hundred years old and his squaw nearly a hundred. Both were buried in the Tonopah Cemetery. Several children throughout the state survive.
